In 1977 the Appalachian Trail was relocated to Pond Mountain south of Watauga Lake and routed through the Watauga Scenic Area. ## Feagins Gap, Sunday, March 14, 1982

The Biology Department of East Tennessee State University has the support of the Bays Mountain Park Commission for building a biological field station at Feagins Gap. Big Laurel Branch, Sunday, March 21, 1982

Big Laurel Branch is one of the many drainages on the north slope of Iron Mountain in northeast Tennessee. Big Laurel Branch was rejected for wilderness designation during the RARE II study but it may qualify for special management because it is reported to be the only area in Tennessee where Carolina Hemlock (<u>Tsuga heterophylla</u>) is reproducing itself.

From the south end of the bridge over Wilbur Lake (Little Wilbur) we will climb to the top of the falls of Little Laurel Branch then cross a small summit and descend to Big Laurel Branch and follow Big Laurel Branch upstream (east) to its sharp turn to the south. There we will climb the nose of a spur in the middle of the drainage and head northeast to the Iron Mountain Trail. The Iron Mountain Trail will be followed east to the Appalachian Trail and the A.T. followed for 2.8 miles south to Watauga Dam Road for a Total of 6 1/4 miles.

The hike has not been scouted and will be an exploration of the Big Laurel drainage; we may encounter bogs, briers, bracken and bramble. The hike is rated difficult.

Clothes should include sturdy hiking shoes, long pants, long sleeved shirt, and gloves. Carry lunch, water, and rain gear.



Beyond 6000 Hike - Mt. Celo - March 27, 1982 - Bob Miller Billed as a difficult hike, it was every bit of that. Ken Hatfield, Rick Culbertson, Kurt Kauffman and Bob Miller got off at 8:00 A.M. for the 80 mile drive to Pensocola, N.C. We were joined at Burnsville, N.C. by Herrick Brown of West Jefferson, N.C., former operator of Mt. Le Conte Lodge, and still a vigorous hiker at 69. Herrick made arrangements to meet us via shortwave radio, courtesy of John Hawkins. After numerous switch backs, we decided to shortcut by bushwhaking up the north fork of Cattail Creek. It was a rugged climb, but did save time and distance. We lunched just below Deep Gap on the road bed of an abandoned logging railroad. 

## Insulated Outdoor Clothing Materials

There are many heated arguments about the relative merits of down and other types of insulating materials for outdoor clothing. A recent study by Kaufman, Bothe and Meyer at the University of Wisconsin sheds some light on the subject. In a nutshell, the answer seems to be, "It doesn't make a lot of difference". The final paragraph of their article, which appeared in the February 5, 1982 issue of SCIENCE, reads as follows:

Burton and Edholm (3) observed that the principal function of the filling material is "merely to immobilize the enclosed air, preventing convection currents and making it effectively 'dead air.'" Our findings, gathered by a single method comparing the thermal insulating qualities of fillers in the form they are used by the consumer, confirm this statement. None of the synthetic fillers has a superior ability to provide "warmth" in clothing. It seems that factors other than thermal insulation, such as weight, drapability, durability, and cost should be the major factors in selecting outerwear containing thermal insulation materials. The effects of moisture and bellows action produced by the wearer's activity may outweigh thermal insulative values in the wearer's perception of warmth.



Jones Branch to Doll Flats - Bridge Construction - April 29, 1982 - Ray Hunt On April 29, Jeff Siirola, Darrol Nickels and Ray Hunt built two bridges for the Appalachian Trail across Jones Branch near Campbell Hollow Road. This is on the new six-mile relocation from Jones Branch to Doll Flats. We built them from oak planks and railroad crossties. One bridge is across Jones Branch and the other is across a boggy area nearby. We did this in an evening after work and until dark.

On May 17, we took lumber for six more bridges and put them temperarily in place over six more boggy areas near Jones Branch. This time, the work was done by Jack Young, Doug Lowman, and Ray Hunt. This was another trip after work until dark. It was an important trip, because the Trail had just been put into use and the bogs would soon have become impassible. The relocation from Doll Flats to Jones Branch has been opened. Tom Pridgen and Kay
Newell spent Sunday, May 16 painting out the blazes on the old trail. Gordon Newland,
John Thompson and Frank Williams blazed the new trail from Doll Flats to 19E and

until 6 o'clock marking the new trail north of 19E. The rain did not add much to the
appearance of the blazes, but the relocation is open.

#### FOR THE RECORD

Appalachian Trail - Vermont to Maine, August, 1980 - John Thompson
On August 12, I returned to Rutland, Vt. to resume backpacking the A.T. north to the Kennebec River, Maine. This 350-mile stretch kept me busy for five weeks and included much of the most difficult sections of the Trail (i.e. steep, rocky areas such as the Mahoosucs, White Mt. National Park and the Bigelows). Again I was alone except for the last 85 miles in Maine with TEC Hiking Club members John Kiefer, Gordon Newland and Darrol Nickels. However I met many more hikers than during my June trip from New Jersey to Rutland, and walked at times with several "thru hikers" (Georgia to Maine).

My equipment was similar to that carried in June except it now included a down sleeping bag and a single pot for all cooking (to boil water for rehydrating breakfast and supper meals).

August 11 - After five weeks rest from my 350-mile June hike on the A.T. from New Jersey, I'm on the bus headed back to the Trail at Rt. 103, Rutland, Vt. via Port Authority in New York.

August 12 - Here we go again! On the Trail at 4 PM after a seven mile taxi trip from the Rutland bus station. Spent the night at nearby Clarenden shelter under stormy skies. Enjoyed fine blackberries and the company of two southbound hikers, one of whom was a Londoner headed for Springer Mt.

August 13 - Tough climb over Killington and Pico Peaks (ski resort with about 5000'elevation change). Spent night at Pico Camp Cabin after a 10-mile hike. Nearby spring water was so cold it frosted a pan. Met six backpackers and 15 sightseers today.

August 14 - Up late and not on Trail until 7 AM. Ate second breakfast at the Inn in Sherbourne Pass. Afterwards turned East on the A.T., leaving the "Long Trail", on which the A.T. runs for about 100 miles. Spent night at Stoney Brook shelter with a thru hiker, Peter Horwitz. A downpour at 10 PM was deafening on the metal roof. Also worth recording that a mouse bit me on the finger during the night. The mark was there next morning.

August 13 - HIKAT 17 miles in nice weather today trying to reach Cloudland shelter. However I could not find it from the Trail Guide by sunset, so spent night in tent in a field. Only water came from a farm brook so I purified it with Halazone tablets.

August 16 - Up at 5:20 AM. Passed Cloudland shelter in 1/2 mile. (poor Guidebook instructions). After 10-miles hiking I spent the night in Happy Hill Cabin. No water at cabin after an extremely dry year. Using a hiker's note, I finally found a tiny spring 1/2 mile away. Before dark two Ga. to Me. hikers came in with a huge black dog which carried it's own pack. They were Mark Shiewetz and Barbara Crouse, who I was to see many times before reaching Maine. Mark was from Wilmington, Del. (father a Dupont engineer) and had spent three weeks in a Pittsfield, Mass. hospital after picking up an intestinal parasite in Va.

August 17 - Up at 6 AM and off on a beautiful day for Hanover, N.H. where Dartsmouth College is located. The Dartsmouth Outing Club maintains the Trail in this area and their horizontal orange and black blazes resemble football stockings. Spent the night "on campus" at the Occom Inn - ate supper at college cafeteria with students and some hikers. Washed clothes, enjoyed hot shower, a bed and kitchen food.

August 18 - Off at 8:30 AM after picking up food pkg. at Hanover Post Office. Great view from precipitous "The Ledges". Hard 15 miles to Trapper John Shelter, where again no water in the brook. Finally found a cup-size pool 200 yd. downstream. Three thru hikers came in late, including Peter Horwitz. Good campfire talk and to bed at 9 PM.

August 19 - Up at 6 AM and off for Cube Mountain shelter 11.5 miles north on a cool, cloudy, windy day. Tough climb up and down Smarts Mt. COLD on top, with no view due to clouds. No water at Cube shelter - finally found some by following a dry spring bed but got lost for a half hour in returning to shelter. Three backpackers came in before dark.

August 20 - Off early, still in fog, with much road walking. Camped in tent on shore of Wauchapauca Pond, two miles from southern boundary of White Mountains Park.

August 21 - Picked up a food package in nearby Glencliff, N.H. post office and called home. The 11 pounds of new food made the pack seem very heavy. Tough climb up 4800' Mt. Moosiluke. Limited views from top but could see imposing Mt. Lafayette ahead. Had an extremely tough (dangerous) decent down to Beaver Creek shelter, where I spent the night.

August 22 - Early start for another tough climb up Kinsman Mt. (scrambling up and down ledges with help of iron rings and bushes). Took me 11 hours to do 11 miles today. Spent night with several other hikers at Kinsman Pond shelter where we had to boil water for drinking (a helicopter had accidently dropped a privy in the pond nine years earlier).

August 23 - Up late after a miserable night with little sleep due to mice getting in my pack. I'm getting well into the Park reaching Franconia Notch at noon where I enjoyed a sunny lunch while drying clothes. Spent night at Liberty Campground on steep Franconia Ridge, where we pitched tents on wood platforms.

August 24 - Off early on a beautiful day for climb past timberline over bare Franconia Ridge, over Mt. Lincoln and on to Mt. LaFayette (5240'-highest since Mt. Rogers in Va.). Great views in all directions, including Mt. Washington many miles ahead, but windy and cold. Spent night at Greenleaf Hut, one mile down the Mt., with 50 other hikers (\$17.75 for bunk, supper and breakfast - great food - all you wanted). While there I washed clothes, waxed boots, semi-bathed and talked to other hikers (a 50-year hut anniversary party was held the night before, with former crews present, plus the 80-year old first hut director, who was flown in by helicopter). Mark and Barbara, who I first met days earlier, turned up again.

August 25 -Tough climb back up Mt. Lafayette to the A.T. and on over Mt. Garfield. Much elevation change today. I intended spending the night at Mt. Guyot shelter but it was off the Trail, so I took a chance and went on, finding a tiny spring near dark with a spot nearby where I could pitch my tent. In bed before dark due to rain.

August 26 - Up early and off on a sunny morning. Stopped at the next hut, Galehead, for candy, blueberry muffins and lemonaide. Then an easy hike on level trail to Ethan Pond shelter where I spent a crowded night with seven other hikers. The shelter caretaker was a girl who swapped me an orange for a soup package.

August 27 - I was up and down until 2 AM chasing mice out of my pack (they can run up and down the string from which pack is suspended). Nice trail down to Crawford Notch, followed by a tough climb up Webster Mountain in fog and light rain. Due to the weather I spent the night in Mizpah Hut, which was a big place filled with hikers (there are eight App. Mountain Club huts, about eight miles apart, in the Park. All offer good accommodations but are heavily occupied and reservations are recommended. They are expensive but their use makes hiking thru White Mountains Park much easier).

August 28 - Off early toward Mt. Washington, six miles ahead, but no views due to heavy fog. The fog cleared at noon except for the crest of Mt. Washingtons magnificent views otherwise. Spent night at Lake of the Clouds hut, only 1200' below the summit.

August 29 - Reached top of Mt. Washington (highest point in New England at 6228') at 9:30 AM on sunny day, with magnificent 360° views -Site of some of the world's worst weather. On the way down the cog railroad train passed me and three months later a picture of me at that point arrived in the mail, taken by Carol Ennis, a young teacher from Wellesly, Mass., who had also taken a picture of me on the way up when we stopped to rest and chat. Then on over the Northern Presidential Range and down to timberline at near dark, where I found a spring and tent site after 10 tough miles.

August 30 - Up at daybreak and on the Pinkham Notch, where I rented a ride to Gorham. There I reserved a motel room, picked up a food package at the P<sub>1</sub>O<sub>1</sub> and left my pack. Carrying a day pack I returned to Pinkham Notch for a very tough climb up Wildcat Mt; on the A<sub>1</sub>T; to Carter Notch But where I spent the night.

August 31 - Much rain and lightning last night. After a good breakfast including bacon and pancakes, I was back on the trail for Gorham, N.H. and my motel room, where I did laundry, watched T.V. read the New York Times and enjoyed the comforts on a rainy night.

September 1 - Here it is Labor Day! After buying oatmeal, tooth paste and stove fuel, I resumed the A.T. towards the Mahoosuc Range (toughest part of the entire Trail). Spent night at Gentian Pond shelter, which sleeps 16 comfortably in a beautiful spot. Again met up with Mark and Barbara. I fell hard twice today, but no damage.

September 2 - Bad storm last night. This is difficult walking due to severe decents/climbs thru steep gorges. Trail extremely wet and running with water even on mountain tops. In many boggy spots a two-plank walk is provided for hundreds of yards. Again I fell twice but broke only my walking stick. Reached Full Goose shelter at 6PM - exhausted, to find Mark and Barbara cooking supper.

September 3 - Cold and windy morning. Off early for Mahoosuc Notch, said to be the toughest mile on the A.T. For me it was took me two hr. to do one mile, being very careful not to fall. Reached Speck Pond shelter at 4PM, after hiking only six miles in 8 1/2 hrs.

September 4 - Great views from summit of Old Speck on a beautiful day - could see Mt. Washington 30 m. south. Potential trouble - my right heel hurts, feels like a "stone bruise". After a long 13 m. I reached Frye Brook shelter, where I bathed my heel in the icy water and used Exocane ointment on it. Ate a double supper, plus local berries, to get rid of escess food.

September 5 - Am close to Canada - met three Canadan hikers whose broken English about trail relocations was hard for me to understand. Funny thing happened today. Saw many moose tracks and others of a large dog or small bear, which made me uneasy. Then while I was resting after lunch, a military jet flew over very low and fast and I jumped a foot thinking a bear had me. After steep decent into Crafton Notch, I spent the night at Hall Mt. shelter with Mark and Barbara, who had dropped off the Trail for two days to get a pack repaired. She cooked a cheesecake for me to celebrate my impending completion of the entire A.T. - very good, and appreciated.

September 6 - Off for Andover, Me., eight miles North, where I am to meet the Eastman hikers for final week. Spent night at Mrs. Eva Bodwell's boarding house, where I enjoyed a hot tub and good meals. Andover is a quiet village with few stores and 700 residents.

September 7 - The Eastman hikers (Nickels, Newland, Kiefer) drove in at mid-morning. We left the car at the A.T. crossing for the southbound Eastman group to pick up, and were off at noon for Elephant Mt. shelter, where we spent the night and drank a toast to a deceased fellow hiker, Dick Ardell, using wine made in his home town of Canadaigua, N.Y.

September 8 - Hiked 12 miles in sunny, cool weather on nice trail. Spent the night at Sabbath Pond shelter, with three Ga.-Me. hikers. Went to bed at 7PM due to cold weather.

September 9 - Temperature below 40°F and I walked fast to get warm. This is nice trail - the MATC does a fine job of trail maintenance. Hiked 10.6 miles to Piazza Rock shelter, where we met the Eastman group hiking South (Hunt, Chew, Foster, Lowman, Hatfield, Gibson). Had 12 people around the campfire that night.

September 10 - On a cold, windy morning the climb over bar summit of Saddleback Mt. was unbelieveable. The wind' over one mile of bare rook was 40-50mph at under  $40^{\circ}$ F. I felt the closest I've been yet to hypothermia while hiking. Noteworthy too was the small, cold garter snake Nickels saw. Spent the night at Poplar Ridge shelter.

September 11 - Slept pretty well last night on a "base ball bat" floor (2"-dia. poles). Camped beside a rushing stream on a deserted road, where we hid our packs for retrieval next day by car.

September 12 - Off early for a complicated day over top of frosty Croker Mt. to get one of the cars parked by Southbound group. Retrieved packs and drove to the Kennebec River where we were ferried across just before dark by an 82-year old native (now we were to hike south; Newland was picked up by a float plane on nearby pond for transfer north where he was to hike alone a trail portion he had missed a year earlier). We walked the last mile by flashlight to spend the night at Pierce Pond shelter. We had arranged to eat supper at the nearby "Carrying Place" (a comfortable log camp for hunters, etc) but all they had left was bread, cheese and one tomato. Heard loons on the lake and saw traces of the Northern Lights that night. The shelter area was crowded with hikers. Walked 16 1/2 miles today.

September 13 - Off in the sun headed South on a fine, level trail. This is Moose country. Wish I could see one - I think. This is their mating season and they are unpredictable. Saw a dozen thru hikers, about the last of this year's group from Georgia. Spent night in the rain at Jerome Brook shelter after 16 easy miles. Met several north bound hikers who I knew and they were confused to now see me headed south.

September 14 - Off for the tough Bigelows in the rain. Much rock climbing. The views are said to be splendid but we couldn't see 50 ft. in the fog. Spent night at Avery Peak shelter, which was a good decision because it rained hard near dark. We filled our water bottles from the roof run-off.

September 15 - After a cold night we were up at 6AM for my last day on the 2100 mile A.T. Off in windy, thick fog. Met Terry McGovern (a state environmental employee) at Horn Pond shelter. He planned to swim to the center of nearby pond and take water samples in 40° weather! He took our picture and got info for a newspaper article, and later sent us a copy. HOORAY! reached Kiefer's car at 12:30 to complete the A.T. (except for 10m. in Penn. which I did in October). The sun is out and now we can see how fine the Bigelows are. Changed to dry, clean clothes and off for the long trip home at 1:15PM. Spent the night at Ramada Inn in Newburgh, N.Y. and arrived home at sunset the next day.

It is located generally on the eastern watershed of Grandfather Mt., and is adjacent to Linville Gorge, and Brown Mt. (the Mt. with lights).

We plan to paddle Section I. Section 2 is Cl. III-IV-V, so we will enjoy looking at those rapids as we drive upstream to the Section I put-in.

Section I is 5 miles of Nantahala - like water, though a smaller stream; almost continuous Cl. II with a couple of Cl. III rapids. A road runs directly alongside the stream, so we can scout most of it as we drive to the put-in.

It is partly in the Pisgah Natl. Forest, and partly privately owned; in a very popular area for canoeing, fishing, camping, and hiking. It can be also enjoyed by non-paddlers - so picnicers and/or hikers will be welcome also. They can assist with the shuttle. The leader can assist with a map of hiking trails.

Usual gear is required: lunch and beverage, life jacket, spare paddle, bailer, sponge, appropriate clothing, plus additional dry clothes. Expect to be gone about 10 hours.

In the event of insufficient water in Wilson Creek, the Green River (Cl. I-III) is the suggested alternative. It is about 20 miles south of Asheville, and is damcontrolled. (Other suggestions for alternatives will be welcomed).


#### FOR THE RECORD

This was scheduled for Big Butt. Instead, the hike will be to Little Bottom, on Deer Park Mountain southwest of Greenville, Tennessee. The area is actually southwest of Hot Springs, N.C. and includes a drive along the Spring Creek Gorge. This is an area we don't visit very often. If the leaves are in color it should be a scenic hike. If the leaves are gone we will have good views of the surrounding mountains.

We will leave building 215 parking lot at 8:00 A.M. and should return to Kingsport by 5:30-6:00 P.M. Some of us will plan on eating at Augustinos (an excellent Italian restaurant) in Greenville.

Driving distance is about 140 miles round trip, and the hike is about  $6\ 1/2$  miles along a ridge with some ascents and a long descent into Hot Springs. Should be a moderate hike. Bring water, lunch, rain gear, cameras, etc.



Appalachian Trail Maintenance - 1982 - reporting - Collins Chew

Every Trail Team got out again this year which is very encouraging. The Trail is generally in excellent shape. We are all very impressed with the number of blowdowns on the Trail since the USFS was asked to leave them for us; however, with the increased use of chainsaws, most were cleared this year. The latex paint and foam stamp pad are apparently a successful system for blazing. We have very few (2) complaints about getting lost and do have reports that the blazes from the past few years still look good. Four sections were not reblazed this year for one reason or another. A few steep, rough sections remain: the USFS continues to improve the new relocation which crosses US19E and it is a major improvement for getting the Trail off of roads. The North side of Pond Mountain remains a problem. An additional problem originated on Pond Mountain as the USFS used the Trail as a bulldozer road to stop a forest fire which burned up to the Trail. The club Echo brushcutter (weedeater) has proved very effective for clearing heavy brush and most of the Trail was cleared of last years briars. This years annual growth, nettles in particular, has been the primary complaint and we do not have an effective solution to the problem. An "addendum" to the AT Guide for our section was published which gives the relocations to date. It is an insert in Guides now being sold by the Appalachian Trail Conference and copies of the addendum are available by writing and sending a self-addressed stamped envelope to ATC Headquarters.

- 1. Spivey Gap to Nolichucky River Reporting John Thompson
  On April 18, 1982 and June 19, 1982 two groups hiked in different directions doing Trail maintenance on a rather cool day without a cloud in the sky. The chainsaw would not start so blowdowns were cut out on a second trip.

  First trip: Jack Boyles, Bruce and Mary Cunningham, Kenneth Hatfield, Ben Thompson, and John Thompson.

  Second trip: Doug Lowman and John Thompson.
- 2. Nolichucky River to Indian Grave Gap Reporting Bob Hembre
  On July 11, 1982 five of us hiked about half of the Nolichucky Gorge to Beauty Spot section before heavy rain turned us back. The blazes were in very good shape so no blazing was needed. Occasional deadfall removal and weedclipping were all that was really required. The leader returned later to complete the hike and install signs. We encountered three groups of backpackers who were all very appreciative of our efforts and who suggested some other sections which need continued maintenance. Our super tough glad bag of garbage, filled to the rim from Cherry Gap shelter, didn't quite live up to its reputation--giving out about 2/10th of a mile from its destination. Participants were Jim Bishop and Jack Litz of Troop 48, Ted Caldwell, Jim Crowell, Dave Olson, Joe Givens, and Bob Casper
- 5. Iron Mountain Gap to Hughes Gap Reporting Gordon Newland
  The 8.1 mile section was painted in both directions on May 15, 1982. Trash was picked up, shelter was cleaned, water trails were blazed, blow downs were cleared and briars, weeds and overhanging branches were cleared. Everyone seemed to enjoy the exercise. Cars were left at Hughes Gap and Iron Mountain without damage. Several members of the team turned out and they were assisted by several volunteer visitors. - 7. Carvers Gap to Bradley Gap Reporting Joel Youngblood

  Blazes were painted as needed in both directions. Brush was cleared on the Southern half of the Trail. Several hawks were seen. Participants were Dale Blakely, Dave Olsen, and Joel Youngblood.
- 8. US19E to Bradley Gap Reporting Tom Pridgen
  On a gorgeous Sunday, June 20, 1982, four hikers painted blazes, picked up trash, trimmed branches and cleared some nettles and seeds on the Appalachian Trail from US19E to Bradley Gap. The recently (May '82) relocated portion of this section is being used and is well marked and clear of brush, some grading work remains.
  On the way in from 19E we encountered 4 hikers. We heard a bird call which reminded us of the sound from a video pinball game. We had lunch at Doll Flats with a dozen or so appreciative Knoxville Sierra Club members. Crossing "The Hump" we met two horses and a mule (without riders). The horses preferred licking our fresh blazes to eating grass. Descending into Bradley Gap we overtook Dick Wickman who is employed at Kodak Park. We also met a gentleman from Louisville, KY. who wore only shorts, rubber boots, a hat and a pair of binoculars no shirt, no pack, no water, no rainwear. He was quite content to be 6 miles from a road.
  Recrossing the Hump we came upon two additional horses (with riders), and an aggressive groundhog at Doll Flats, a large blacksnake in Wildermine Hollow and a local old-timer who allowed that "more city people should get out and walk". We agreed.
  The sun was shining all day, the temperature was in the low 80's and the forest was alive with late spring a perfect day. Those participating were Tom Pridgen, Frank Williams, Gene Whitney, and Connie Kelly.

- 9. Bear Branch Road to Bitter End School Reporting Jeff Vanderbilt
  Fair skies and pleasant hiking temperatures greeted Dave Kashdan, Tish Jones, Patti Raynolds, Pete Raynolds,
  Joe DeLoach, Molly Miller, Russ Brogden, Kathv McDavid, Jeff Vanderbilt, and Ipso on our late spring maintenance
  trip. The good spirit of the group was not detured by the leader's inability to find the north end of the trail,
  which resulted in adding an additional 4 miles to the 9.6 mile section. After finding the trail a hard day's effort
  of maintenance was commenced. Our group finally emerged at 19E at about 8:00 p.m. Special thanks are due to
  Russ Brogden for providing a chain saw for the day.
- 10. Bitter End School to Dennis Cove Reporting Jeff Siirola
  On Sunday, June 6, 1982, five TEHC hikers cleared and blazed the ridgeline section of the AT along Whiterocks
  Mountain from Bitter End to Dennis Cove. The weather was excellent and the Flame Azalea were in full bloom.
  Helping out were David Attride, Cinda Foglesong, Tom Pell, Ken Sampson, and Jeff Siirola.
- 11. Dennis Cove to Laurel Fork Reporting Frank Williams
  Blazes were repainted, a few small blow-downs removed, and two short sections dug by Ward Cochran, Jack Young, and Frank Williams. We met three through-hikers, two over-night hikers, two day hikers, and a church group camped on the blue blazed trail near Hampton.
- 12. Pond Mtn. at Laurel Fork Gorge to U.S. 321 Lester Church On the 12th of June in "82" Eight hardy souls set out to do, The annual clearing of the AT Trail. And when we were finished, we had just begun, For weeds and blazes were all we'd done, But for blowdowns the Manpower was just too frail. So the 19th day of the month appeared, And two more souls set out without fear, To fight for the life of the Trail. Two saws, an axe, a rope so stout, Brought 9 blowdowns down and out, To assure the thru-hiker his quest wouldn't fail. A final trip was made next day, We placed some signs to lead the way, So no one could stray from the Trail. Now the Trail has left these hikers spent, But all indeed were glad they went, And we THANK them for a job done well. "

Among the over 500 footprints exposed were the ones where they discovered that the meat eating dinosaurs could swim. Later that evening we met the Southbound group at Pinkham Notch. Sunday morning we drove to Franconia Notch (Whitehouse Bridge) and climbed above timberline to Mt. Liberty, Lincoln and found on Mt. Lafyette a pair of Green Berets playing like a Russian outpost. One let us examine his M-16 and sucessors to "C"rations. At "Greenleaf Hut" the other one became the life of the party. The Hut crew served us typical fine meals prepared from food backpacked up in 60 pound loads. The inside bunks were most welcome in spite of the crowding.

We spent 7 days hiking north from hut to hut. We met many interesting people. For three days these people included the last AMC Range Hike group to be led by Cecil Jones. There were many interesting plants and flowers. There were a few berries with service berry being the most plentiful edible kind. We crossed many impressive mountains, most of which rose above timberline. Mt. Washington was the high point (6288') and afforded splendid views and a pleasant day. The trail was of course rough and steep with some sections simply crossing boulder fields. There were two days of rain. One of these was the most exciting day of the trip with over two miles above timberline, 40 foot visibility, winds above 70 mph and rain. The wind on Mt. Washington that day was over 100 mph. We practically walked into Lakes of the Clouds Hut before we saw it.

We took a number of side trips to peaks, Thoreau Falls, etc. Everyone stayed in pretty good physical shape with only a few blister problems. We confirmed that when it rains you get wet no matter how well prepared you are.

At Madison Hut on the last night the Range Hike Group wanted entertainment. Great music was furnished by Jud Barry and three members of a Blue Grass Band from Hartford, Connecticut. Instruments used were harmonica, recorder, guitar, and piano.

We returned to Pinkham Notch on Saturday, July 31 and drove home by Squam Pond of "On Golden Pond" fame. Quite by chance, we met Gordon Newland and Darrol Nickels of the southbound group in the delightful Spring House Restaurant in Woodstock, Virginia.

Southward - Gordon Newland, leader; Darrol Nickels, Jean Brown, Barbara Kiser, Jack, Evonne and Timothy Crowder.

After a night at Pinkham Notch Lodge the group got its initiation to New Hampshire trails. We skirted Mt. Washington, crossed Mt. Madison above tree-line and arrived up at Madison Hut just in time to wash up for supper. The Monday trip from Madison Hut to Lake of the Clouds Hut was all above tree-line and the weather was windy. The chilli at Mt. Washington was appreciated, since the temperature of 50° and 70 mph wind made it seem more like winter than July. Tuesday found us strolling along Mt. Eisenhower in beautiful sunny weather. We arrived at Mizpah Hut in time for sunning and laundry. Unfortunately, Mizpah was suffering a water shortage, so laundry waited. Wednesday was our longest hike, 13.5 miles to Zealand Falls Hut. The drought was broken and when we arrived at Zealand Falls there was no shortage of water from any direction. Zealand Falls Hut has its own hydroelectric system which powers the lights, refrigerators, and hot water heaters. That night we had ice cream for dessert.

Thursday's trip to Galehead Hut was foggy. We had good views of the five fingers at the summits of Guyot and South Twin. The sun came out in the afternoon and we were able to dry out. Friday was a glorious day, clear and cool. We were able to see Mt. Washington and the entire Presidential Range from Mt. Garfield and Mt. Lafeyette. The crew at Greenleaf Hut provided us with an excellent sunset. Saturday found us going our separate ways. Some over Mt. Lincoln and home, others down the Bridle Path and on to Boston for some sight-seeing. It was the first long distance hike for four of the group. No casualties.

Chimney Top Hike - August 29, 1982 - Hugh Thompson
The notice read "relatively easy hike" and milage-wise it was that. The total map distance was about 1 mile. The elevation change, 1600 feet, which gives an overall slope of 32%. The day was warm and sunny, but the hazyness of the day greatly limited our vista. The blocks of sandstone which cap the narrow top of this mountain do resemble chimneys when viewed at the correct angle so this is one explanation of how the mountain was named. There were buzzards checking us out, evidence of wild goats, a few late summer flowers and an abundance of spider webs. Living up to his reputation, the leader allegedly managed to lose the trail on several occasions so that he could engage in his favorite pastime - bush whacking!"
