

CANOE TRIP NOTICE

WILSON CREEK, Cl. II-III, Saturday, April 9, 1983 (Change of Date)

Last year this trip had to be cancelled for lack of water. We feel that enough water can be guaranteed this year, (well almost).

This will be the first time for TEHC canoeists to paddle Wilson Creek. It is located about 5 miles off N.C. Hwy. 181, about 12-15 miles north of Morganton. It is about 90-100 miles to the put-in (2 1/2 hrs driving time). Wilson Creek is listed in Bob Benners Carolina Whitewater. It is located generally on the eastern watershed of Grandfather Mt., and is adjacent to Linville Gorge, and Brown Mt. (the Mt. with lights).

We plan to paddle Section I. (Section 2 is Cl. III-IV-V, so we will enjoy looking at those rapids as we drive upstream to the Section I put-in).

Section I is 5 miles of Nantahala - like water, though a smaller stream; almost continuous C1. II with a couple of C1. III rapids. A road runs directly alongside the stream, so we can scout most of it as we drive to the put-in.

It is partly in the Pisgah Natl. Forest, and partly privately owned; in a very popular area for canoeing, fishing, camping, and hiking. It can be also enjoyed by non-paddlers - so picnicers and/or hikers will be welcome also. They can assist with the shuttle. The leader can assist with a map of hiking trails.

Usual gear is required: lunch and beverage, life jacket, spare paddle, bailer, sponge, plus dry clothes. Expect to be gone about 10 hours.

At this time of year it is very likely that wet suits will be needed to avoid hypothermia, unless it is an especially warm day for early April.

TRIP NOTICE

ANDREWS BALD - April 23, 1983 - (Great Smoky Mountain National Park)

Andrews Bald is one of the lovely grassy balds that are so special in the Southern Appalachians. It is different from most, as it is surrounded by spruce - fir forest rather than hardwoods. It is also one of two balds to be preserved in the Great Smoky Mountain National Park. All others, except Gregory Bald, are to be allowed to revert to forest.

Out hike will be short and easy altough somewhat rocky. Views should be great if the weather is fair. For the ambitious there are other trails to explore such as the 1 mile round trip to Clingman's Dome, highest peak in the park. We will drive to the Forney Ridge Parking area for the hike. On the way home we may eat and tour a bit in Gatlinburg as you wish.

TRIP NOTICE

TURKEYPEN GAP to WATAUGA DAM ROAD - AT, Saturday, April 16, 1983

This hike will start on the northwest side of Iron Mountain at the head of Hurley Hollow. We will hike up a blue blazed jeep trail for about two miles to the crest of Iron Mountain and the AT, and then south on the AT for ten miles to Watauga Dam Road, for a total distance of twelve miles. This hike is rated moderate. Bring a lunch, and dress appropriately for the weather. Meet at the Eastman Personnel Building (B-215) on Lincoln Street in Kingsport at 8:00 a.m., and expect to return to Kingsport by 5:00 p.m. Additional meeting points can be arranged by calling the trip leader, Steve Banks, at 349-6420.

This is a joint Tennessee Eastman Hiking Club/State of Franklin Group, Sierra Club hike, and is the latest in a series of hikes on the AT in SOFG "territory", roughly from the Tennessee-Virginia state line to the Greene-Cocke county line.

CANOE TRIP NOTICE Elk and/or Doe Rivers April 17, 1983

The Elk River is a long-time favorite of club members and an excellent example of the smaller whitewater streams which can be run during the rainy season. It is an exciting, generally Class II trip with some relatively easy Class III rapids. Considerable maneuvering is required as the river is fairly narrow at some points. Tandem paddlers may find the river quite shallow in places unless we have had a recent, heavy rain.



In addition, a dry change of clothes and a sack lunch will undoubtedly make the trip more enjoyable.



LAUREL FALLS, SATURDAY, MAY 21

This is a very pleasant day hike of about 5 miles (round-trip) to scenic Laurel Falls off Highway 321 near Hampton, Tennessee. The trail is generally easy with only a couple rough spots to traverse as it parallels Laurel Creek. TRAIL MAINTENANCE SCHEDULE 1983

Attached are Trail Team listings and assignments for 1983. Our 125 miles of Appalachian Trail is kept open and marked by our efforts - Your help is needed. If your name does not appear on a Trail Team for 1983, and you want to help, call one of the 18 Team Leaders or Trail Maintenance Chairman, Jeff Siirola. It will only take one day of your time.

General Instructions to Team Leaders

Preparation

- 1. Review previous year's Trail Maintenance Report form for your section.
- 2. Pick a date for the Maintenance Trip and plan the trip. Try to complete your section before the middle of July 1983.
- 3. Notify all team members; arrange rides.
- 4. Collins Chew (239-6237) will coordinate equipment if necessary so let him know what date you will go.
- 5. Assemble equipment as needed; white paint, blue paint (small jars), foam paint pads and buckets, 1" or 1 1/2" brushes, paper cups, scrapers, small snips for cutting branches in front of blazes, rags, weeders, clippers, bow saw, signs and fasteners, trail maintenance report form, pen, map, trail description, Adirondack pack, garbage bags, first aid kit. (Most equipment is in Hiking Club room at Eastman Employee Center).

Maintenance Trip

- Do all you can of the following. The more important are listed first.
- 1. Blaze the trail with white paint
- 2. Clear brush along trail Several sections need much work.
- 3. Check the trail description and map comment on needed changes
- 4. Blue blaze trails to water check springs
- 5. Install signs comment on needs and list signs
- 6. Clear blowdowns
- 7. Check shelters comment on problems
- 8. Carry out litter
- 9. Educate hikers you meet as practical and needed

Follow Up

- 1. Clean and return equipment promptly for others to use. Notify Jeff Siirola or Gary Bridges (HDC) of problems or damaged equipment.
- 2. Complete comments in Trail Maintenance Report Forms. Be sure to report needs for additional work. Collect map, report form, Trail description, "For the Record" and trip report for recreation report and mail to Collins Chew, Bldg. 66. A consolidated report for all teams will be prepared.

Craggy Dome - A Different Beyond 6000 Hike Saturday, May 7, 1983

This Beyond 6000 (actually 6080 feet) hike is rated as only moderately difficult because it will be mostly on trail. In order to meet the minimum distance requirement (5 miles), the hike will start at the Craggy Gardens Visitor Center on the Blue Ridge Parkway and come back past the Center at mid-hike so those who wish may hike for a much shorter distance. Total elevation change is estimated at 1500 feet. There should be an abundance of wild flowers along our path. As a special finale for this outing, on the way back we plan to stop at the famous Nu-Wray Inn in Burnsville, North Carolina, for dinner. The meal is served family style and is widely noted for its quality and quantity. Cost is \$8.00 per person for adults and a lesser amount for children, depending on age.

Car pooling is planned and riders should collectively reimburse their driver about 10¢ per mile. Reservations are required for the dinner, and payment must be in my hands by Monday, May 2. 
WILDFLOWER HIKE Natural Tunnel State Park Duffield, Virginia 30 miles from Kingsport on Hwy. 23
