### TRIP NOTICES

(M) HIKE NOTICE - BEYOND 6000 HIKE Saturday, April 21, 1984

Leader:

Note: This hike was originally scheduled for May 19, but because of a conflict in the leader's schedule, it has been changed.

Rated as moderate, this Beyond 6000 hike will include two peaks - Clingman's Dome (6643) and Mt. Collins (6188). The hiking distance is 7.5 miles and the change in elevation about 1,600 feet. The entire hike will be along the Appalachian Trail. Departure will be from the parking lot in front of B-215 at 8:00 a.m. Driving distance is 125 miles each way. We expect to hit the trail by about 10:30 a.m. and be off of it by 4:00 p.m. Those who choose to drive straight back to Kingsport should expect to get home by 6:30-7:00 p.m. If some elect to visit in Gatlinburg, the return time will be later. Bring warm clothing (preferably layered), rain gear, sturdy shoes or boots, water, and lunch. If you like, you may wish to include a camera, binoculars, and a trail snack. Car pooling is planned and riders should collectively reimburse their driver about \$0.12 per mile. Reservations are not required; but if you plan to go, I'd appreciate knowing. (M) <u>HIKE NOTICE</u> - BACKBONE ROCK (Near Damascus, Virginia) to AT Leader: Kirk Finch Saturday, May 5, 1984

This is an easy to moderate hike — easy because it is a good trail, moderate because we will gradually ascend 1,200 feet and back down again. If you haven't been to Backbone Rock it is worth the trip even if you don't want to hike up to the AT. The Rock is a rock outcrop just above the creek and road. It is 50-100 feet high, several hundred yards long with widths from 3 feet to 20 feet. For the light-headed, where it is 3 feet wide there are handrails. There is a picnic ground for those who just want to relax by the creek. The hike will take about 4 hours; driving time from Kingsport is 1 1/4 hour. Bring rain gear, water, and lunch. We will leave B-215 parking lot at 9:00 a.m. and should be back in Kingsport by 4:30 p.m. If anyone wants to eat before returning to Kingsport, some of us will go to Troutdale or the Hardware Restaurant in Abingdon. CANOE TRIP - Laurel Creek, S. Fork Holston River Saturday, May 5, 1984

Class I-II (III) - This is a real "fun run" requiring waters from spring rains to fill the small streams. It is almost continuous Class II, with occasional Class I places and one Class III rapids. Put-in is on very small Laurel Creek about 2 miles above Damascus, Virginia, and ends on considerably larger South Fork Holston River, after two pontages and much splashing. Numerous other creeks add to the flow enroute. We will leave B-215 parking lot at 8:30 a.m., Saturday, May 5, 1984. Usual gear is required; lunch and beverage (in water bag), life jacket, spare paddle, bailes, sponge, and appropriate clothing (consider both the air and water temperatures).
