(M) HIKE NOTICE - Craggy Dome - (Beyond 6,000 Dinner Hike) Leader - Bob Miller (scheduled Saturday, June 2, 1984) Last spring we were thwarted in climbing Craggy Dome (6,080 feet) because the ranger thought it was in the Asheville water shed and thus closed to hiking. We now have written confirmation that it may be climbed. This hike is rated as only moderately difficult because it will be mostly on trail. In order to meet the minimum distance requirement (5 miles), the hike will start at the Craggy Gardens Visitor Center on the Blue Ridge Parkway and come back past the Center at mid-hike so those who wish may hike for a much shorter distance. Total elevation change is estimated at 1,500 feet. There should be an abundance of wild flowers along our path. As a special finale for this outing, on the way back we plan to stop at the famous Nu-Wray Inn in Burnsville, North Carolina, for dinner. The meal is served family style and is widely noted for its quality and quantity. Cost is \$8.00 per person for adults and a lesser amount for children, depending on age. Plan to depart from the parking lot in front of B-215 at 8:30 a.m. Driving distance is approximately 100 miles each way. Expect to get back to Kingsport about 9:30 p.m., if you stay for dinner (6 p.m.). Bring rain gear, sturdy shoes, water, and lunch. Optional gear - camera, binoculars, and a trail snack. Car pooling is planned and riders should collectively reimburse their driver about 12¢ per mile. Reservations are required for the dinner, and payment must be in my hands by Friday, May 25. (M) HIKE NOTICE - Hensley Settlement

(scheduled Saturday, June 9) This restored community is located on a plateau where Brush Mountain (Kentucky) meets Cumberland Mountain in Cumberland Gap National Historical Park. The settlement existed in pioneer fashion from 1903 to 1951. Hike distance is 8 miles round trip, and drive distance is approximately 180 miles round trip. Meet at Eastman Personnel (B-215) at 8 a.m. Bring lunch, water, and appropriate clothing. Call trip leader at 615-246-3787 for additional information.

CANOE CAMPING NOTICE - New River Leader - Gerald Morie (scheduled Saturday-Sunday, June 9-10) Class I-II. South Fork of the New River, North Carolina, Highways 88 and 16 at Index, North Carolina to South of Mouth of Wilson, Virginia. The South Fork of the New River is part of the National Scenic Rivers System. It is a gently flowing river with some Class I water and easy Class II rapids. This trip is a repeat of a 1983 trip that is designed for beginners and families. We plan to take out at the New River State campground early Saturday afternoon so we can swim and relax before supper. We will leave Kingsport on Saturday, June 9, at 6:30 a.m. from the Colonial Heights McDonalds. The drive to Index takes about three hours. If you wish you may camp at the State Park Friday, June 8, and sleep later than the rest of us. We plan to return to Kingsport about 8 p.m. on Sunday, June 10. Participants should bring canoe, three paddles, personal camping gear, food for four meals, and cooking gear. You must notify Gerald Morie at 288-4748 or B-150B by June 4 if you plan to participate. Include your name, telephone number, canoe partner, and if you have one, a double canoe rack.

(M) HIKE NOTICE - Massie Gap to Elk Garden Leader - Doug Lowman (scheduled Saturday, June 3) This section of the AT goes along the side of Mt. Rogers with elevations ranging from 4400 to 5400 feet. Come prepared for a beautiful hike. Bring camera, lunch, water, comfortable hiking shoes, warm clothes (depending on the weather up there), and rain gear. Hiking distance is 7 miles, but the car shuttles will be time consuming. Meet at TEC personnel office (B-215) parking lot at 7:15 a.m. for a 7:30 a.m. departure (note early departure time). CANOE TRIP - Nantahala River

(scheduled June 9-10 - note date change) Class II-III. Long a tradition with seekers of whitewater fun, the Nantahala River offers something for everyone. A fast-moving, clean, clear stream - the River of the Noonday Sun - has become a favorite with river runners from all over the southeastern U.S. Although there's plenty of action, only two rapids offer serious challenges and can easily be avoided, if one wishes. The Nantahala is a good river for practicing your canoe control and wave riding techniques - solo or tandem. Another feature is its unusual mobile obstacles (better known as rafts) which are usually found in abundance. Because of the lengthy drive, it is advisable to stay over and run the river on both Saturday and Sunday. Camping is available close by, as are other accommodations. (M) HIKE NOTICE - Sams Gap to Spivey Gap (AT)

(scheduled Saturday, June 16) This hike is rated moderately difficult with a distance of 12.2 miles and approximately 2,400 feet of climbing. This hike goes over the open summit of Big Bald (5,516 feet). Bring a lunch, water, sturdy boots or shoes, and clothing suitable for the weather. Meet at the Tennessee Eastman Personnel Building, B-215, on Lincoln Street in Kingsport at 8 a.m. or at the main Johnson City post office at 8:30 a.m. Additional meeting points can be arranged by calling the trip leader, Steve Banks, at 288-3570. This is a Tennessee Eastman Hike Club/State of Franklin Group, Sierra Club hike.

CANOE TRIP - Toe River

(scheduled Saturday, June 16) Class II-III. The 11.5 mile section of the Toe that we will canoe is a fun Class II-III. The take-out is at Red Hill, North Carolina, at the NC 197 bridge. GRINDSTAFF MONUMENT WORK TRIPS

Reporting - Ed Oliver Work trips to the Grindstaff Monument on Iron Mountain were conducted on March 24, April 12, and April 15, 1984. On the first trip the gravestone which was broken into three pieces was carried back to Kingsport to be repaired. The gravestone was repaired by drilling matching holes in the three pieces. Steel pins were inserted in the holes to hold the three pieces together. The stone was also polished. On the second and third trips we carried about 200 pounds of material and one 64-pound piece of the gravestone to the monument site. Most of the repair work to the stone structure was completed. A footing and new foundation for the gravestone was constructed. Those participating in one or more of these trips were Darrol Nickels, Ed Oliver, Jeff Siirola, and Frank Williams. At least one more trip will be required to carry the other two pieces of the gravestone to the site, to set the gravestone in place, and to complete the repair of the stone structure. The total man-hours involved in these three trips is 61.5 hours.

INDIAN GRAVE GAP TO NOLICHUCKY RIVER (AT) - April 14, 1984

This little-known but beautiful section of the AT provided a nice setting for the hike. The trail is very well constructed in the section, contouring in and out of hollows and down along Jones Branch to the Nolichucky.
