(D) HIKE NOTICE - Le Conte Creek Trip

(Scheduled July 14-15, 1984) Although this trip is filled at the moment (limited by the number of reservations at Le Conte Lodge), we have a waiting list and openings frequently occur at the last moment. Call the leader as soon as possible if you wish to be on the waiting list. We will disappear into the Smokies wilderness Saturday morning and climb up the middle of Boulevard Branch, wading pools and climbing waterfalls as opportunities present themselves. Descent Sunday is by trail. The trip is notoriously difficult, so get on the list if you are anxious for a new experience! Call Stan Murray at 323-3677.

CANOE TRIP - French Broad River (Barnard to Hot Springs, NC)

Leader - Warren McLain (Scheduled Saturday, July 14, 1984) Class II-IV. This is an 8-mile section on one of the larger white water streams in the area. "Normal" water flows are 2,000-4,000 cfs. There are 7 or 8 rapids, mostly Class III, and at least one is a Class IV (it can be portaged). Your skill should be intermediate level or higher with experience in Class III rapids to paddle this stream. Normal equipment is required, including flotation in your canoe. Desirable optional equipment is a helmet and throw rope. Meet at 8 a.m. at McDonald's in Colonial Heights. Driving time to put in is approximately 2 1/2 hours. Don't expect to be home before 8 p.m. Please preregister by calling Warren McLain, 288-5762, or Gerald Tustin, Building 150B, 246-8918.

- (E) CAVE HIKE Carter County Saltpeter Cave

  (Scheduled Saturday, July 14, 1984) Meet in the Building 215 parking lot for a 9 a.m. departure. Bring water, flashlight, lunch, and change of clothing. LAUREL CREEK/SOUTH FORK HOLSTON RIVER

BACKBONE ROCK TO AT - May 5, 1984

The leader managed to get the one sunny day in a week for the hike. The leaves were hardly out, but we did see a few small flowers. The black flies were out in tremendous quantities. The trail up to the AT is well marked and a long, steady climb. We also found an interesting short trail along the creek where we watched several people rapelling down the side of Backbone Rock. After the hike, we drove to the top of White Top Mountain where we could see for miles and then on to Troutdale for an excellent gourmet dinner. FLOOD IN LAUREL FORK GORGE Reporting - Doug Lowman On Monday, May 7, 1984, the middle bridge of three bridges over Laurel Fork was washed away by a flood. A through hiker notified ATC headquarters in Harper's Ferry. TEHC was notified Monday afternoon. On Wednesday, John Thompson and Jack Young checked out the flood damage and relocated the AT to a temporary blue-blazed trail, making use of the railroad grade below the bridge. On Saturday, May 12, a work crew built a permanent high water blue-blazed trail from the left rear of the shelter north to the base of Pond Mountain using the railroad grade. The AT, while still usable, will require a ford until the bridge can be replaced later this year. Persons hiking through the gorge or to the falls from U.S. Route 321 can use the AT with the ford or can use the new high water route. Access to the new high water route from the parking lot on U.S. 321 is gained by following the blue-blazed trail to the AT in the gorge, then following the AT north up Pond Mountain onto the railroad grade. Where the AT leaves the railroad grade going north, the high water blue-blazed trail heads south to the shelter. Hikers be aware, use the blue-blazed trail at your own risk. Those in the work crew for the trip on Saturday were Gordon Newland, Darrol Nickels, Doug Lowman, Richard Hanks, Ted and Bill Malone, Morgan Sommerville (ATC Southern Region Representative), and Jim Davidson (USFS Unaka Ranger District).

One final note: During this project, we met twelve through hikers in the gorge. The majority of these hikers chose to by-pass Pond Mountain by using U.S. Route 321.

AT - SPIVEY GAP TO NOLICHUCKEY RIVER - May 12, 1984 Reporting - S. C. Banks A light rain in the morning did nothing to dampen the enthusiasm of the hikers. Many spring wildflowers, including gaywings and painted trillium, were seen. We hiked over Flattop Mountain, around the east and north slopes of No Business Knob, ate lunch at the No Business Shelter, and then hiked over Temple Ridge and down to the Nolichuckey. There are spectacular overlooks of the Nolichuckey from Cliff Rocks. This section does need maintenance as there are a significant number of blowdowns. BIG LAUREL - FRENCH BROAD - May 12, 1984 Reporting - Kurt Kauffman Warren Clark, Charles Leblanc, and Kurt Kauffman checked the river gauge at the Old Mill Cafe and decided the level to be near perfect for a trip down the Big Laurel. With an absolute minimum number of boats for safety, we started downriver and soon encountered light rain. Although the rain didn't last long, the sky was overcast the whole trip. After scouting and paddling the Stairsteps, Suddy Hole, the Narrcus, and numerous other Class III rapids, we reached the French Broad. The French Broad was running about 8,000 cfs, and we decided to paddle the left side of the islands at Kayak Ledge and Frank Bells. This we could do without scouting and it made a faster trip to the takeout at Hot Springs, North Carolina.
