A.T. Hike: Spivey Gap to Nolichucky River, Oct. 3

This section of the A.T. is one of my favorite places to hike. This hike starts at Spivey Gap, at the southern end of the TEHCC section of the A.T. We will ascend along Oglesby Branch, skirt Flattop Mountain, and then slab around the side of No Business Knob before descending along Cliff Ridge to the Nolichucky River. Along the way, we should have excellent views of the surrounding mountains and Nolichucky Gorge. Early fall colors will enhance the beauty of this part of the Southern Appalachians. Bring appropriate clothing, lunch, and water. Meet in the parking lot between McDonalds and Burger King in Colonial Heights at 7:45 a.m. for an 8:00 a.m. departure. Call for more information.

Perhaps the first hints of autumnal colors will grace this moderate 12-mile hike along the ridge of Holston Mountain. If not, perhaps some Closed Gentian will be found. In any event, most views will probably be close at hand, rather than the broad panoramas you may have come to expect from my 'Bald Beyond 4000' series; sorry, but this is mostly a walk through forest. There are no great elevation changes in this section, save the nice descent to Backbone Rock at the end. There is the slight possibility that your hike leader, giddy with the whimsy that strikes in early fall, will choose a different location on the A.T. for this date, so give me a call to confirm. As always, be prepared for weather of the inclement sort, bring lunch, plenty of water, and a sense of humor. We will meet in the parking lot between that Scottish restaurant (McDonalds) and Burger King at 8:00 a.m.

Cumberland Trail Conference and Middle Tennessee & Harvey Broom Sierra Groups needs your help!! They need trail volunteers!! This year's outings, as 2/4 day projects, offer something for everyone. These outings will take place amongst the Turkey Creek watershed, a tributary of the Obed River. Trail work will include the old Fentress-Morgan County Railroad that ran coal and timber out of this territory through the late 20's, and the bridging of Turkey Creek.

CTC will shuttle folks to the backcountry site on both Thursday and Saturday mornings, thus allowing many of the volunteers to join them for a two-day weekend. They will base camp along Turkey Creek, which is accessible via a cross-country 25 minute walk. Volunteers should be prepared for backcountry camping to include tent, bag, pad, stove, first aid kit, water purifier, and meals. Of course, all participants should bring sturdy work boots, work pants, poncho, and gloves.

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A.T. Section Maintenance and Special Projects

• April 2: A.T. Maintenance (Brian Fakes Reporting)

I hiked on Section 13 up to the barn then north, pulled blowdowns off the trail and carried out some garbage.

• June 17: A.T. Maintenance (CB Willis Reporting)

Old Timer's - Adopters Houston Fortner, Nancy Kinkead, Bob Miller, Waymon Mumpower, Neil Ottenfeld, Sandra Perry, Wayne Sparks, Bob Spencer, Clyde Taylor, Rita Taylor, CB Willis, and Malcolm Wolf weeded and clipped the entire sections 17 and 18.

• Aug 14: A.T. Maintenance (CB Willis Reporting)

Old Timer's -Adopters Bob Miller, Wayne Sparks, and CB Willis cut weeds at Deep & Iron Mtn Gap, picked up trash at Beauty Spot.

- Aug 26: A.T. Maintenance (Hueston Fortner Reporting) Old Timer's - Adopter Hueston Fortner hiked section 16 and lopped and carried out a bag of garbage.
- Sept 3: A.T. Maintenance (Ed Oliver Reporting) Ed Oliver & Darrol Nickels conducted rare plant inventory & clipping on Section 19.
- Sept 5: A.T. Maintenance (Bill Fritsch Reporting) Bill & Henrietta (Etta) Fritsch -installed 2- 4x4 posts and blazed the trail on Roan Mt.
- Sept 5: A.T. Maintenance (Joe DeLoach Reporting)

Craig and Joe DeLoach made the second weed-cutting trip of the year (first in May). They were pretty bad. The weeds are especially bad just south of Bear Branch Road and just south of Buck Mountain Road, though they are not briars, stinging nettles, or any other really troublesome weed. We only had a swing blade and couldn't make much of a dent in them. Maybe long-term we can relocate those short sections to less weedy areas. I don't know if I'll get a chance or not before the weeds die off, but I'll try to flag something on the former (and cut them with a scythe/weedeater). We painted blazes with oil-based paint south to north. It was pretty heavily overblazed, so we took many of the blazes out (only south to north). We didn't completely obliterate all of them, and hopefully this won't be confusing to hikers. No blowdowns, no rhododendron clipping needed, but treadway could use some work in many sections.

• Sept 7: A.T. Maintenance (Bill Berry Reporting)

I blazed the trail on Section 20.

• Sept 7: A.T. Maintenance (Steve Banks Reporting)

I measured the Little Rock Knob relocations. The two relocations, around the "second summit" and on Little Rock Knob itself, added 0.97 miles to the A.T. The trail is in excellent shape on this section.

• Sept 9: A.T. Maintenance (CB Willis Reporting)

Old Timer's Hiking Club - Adopters Sam Kinley, Dick Lewis, Bob Miller, Waymon Mumpower, Neil Ottenfeld, Sandra Perry, Ed Schell, Clyde Taylor, and C.B. Willis worked on trail rehab on Section 17.

• Sept 10: A.T. Maintenance (Ed Oliver Reporting)

Darrol Nickels, Frank Williams, and Ed Oliver removed obstructions from Jones Branch trail north of Nolichucky Expeditions on Thursday, September 10. Blowdowns and other materials had partially blocked the stream and had caused the stream to flow in another channel during periods of high water. The new channels were about to cause damage to the trail. We removed the blowdowns and assorted materials at two locations so that the stream will not be diverted to

another channel at high water flows. We put the material that we removed from the stream into the new channel so that the creek would be less likely to move to the new channel. In other words, we spent the day being "beavers".

• Sept 12: A.T. Maintenance (Garry Luttrell Reporting)

We met Bill Stowell at the Burger King in Colonial Heights and he decided to change his hike from the Damascus area to go with us to the Hump. We drove to the parking area above Elk Park and hiked the blue blaze trail to Houston Ridge to connect with the A.T. About 1/2 way up to Houston Ridge, the owners of the private land next to the blue blaze trail are constructing a road to access that area for development. We painted blazes across the Hump, then cut weeds from Bradley Gap to Little Hump. It's dry up there and lots of hikers were asking where to find water.

• Sept 12: A.T. Maintenance (John Thompson Reporting)

I hiked up Hump Mt. to check the posts and blazes on the 1.6 mi. bald-portion over Hump Mt. to Bradley Gap. All 16 locust posts installed in 1991 were in place plus a number of resin/fiberglass lathes installed earlier. Some of the posts were loose and were retamped. Several of each were reblazed. Afterwards, I helped Garry Luttrell cut weeds (bad) South of Bradley Gap.

Hike Trip Reports Hike Report: Indian Grave Gap to Iron Mt. Gap, Aug. 22

I had found last year that Beauty Spot in late August affords blueberries and blackberries. Thus: the perfect time for a hike on the AT from Indian Grave Gap to Iron Mountain Gap. After a short climb from Indian Grave Gap, we made it to the bald, saddened to discover that we were a bit late from the berries - until the keen eyes of Patricia López spied a blueberry bush (tree, I would have said) still full of berries. 2 - 3 pints of blueberries were picked, enjoyed in diverse ways over the next week. (Only a handful of blackberries could be scared up.) The views from the bald were excellent: Roan of course dominating the eastern view and, due south, the tower atop Mt. Mitchell visible in the binocs. We continued trail north to enjoy lunch at the top of Unaka Mountain. I would say the rest was downhill, but no, not quite - I think it may be a rule that places with names like 'Little Bald' are neither. The weather, if on the warm side, cooperated nicely.
