TEHCC New Rental Equipment

REI Hobitat 4 Base Camp Tent - HT-21

HT-21 is the newest tent in the TEHCC rental equipment - purchased in December 2005 for \$245. It is a BIG 4-person tent in terms of vertical – reaching 6'6" at the peak inside. Floor space is roughly 7' deep by 8' wide, thus four long adult sleeping bags would fit. Pictures posted in different reviews also show two cots with plenty of space in between for gear. This tent would serve as an excellent base camp for hiking or canoeing in an area. The tent comes in a large dark brown zip bag that will be heavy and quite stuffed. Please read the instructions on the



bag before starting to be efficient and avoid damaged to the poles. This is a tent you do not want to set up for the first time in the dark or in a hurry. The design uses four flexible snap poles to expand out the nylon walls into a big freestanding box. It will require two people and an area twice the size of the tent. A tarp was purchased to protect the bottom, as this tent is expected to get heavy use like our other big tents HT-26/27. There is a small bag of eight heavy-duty stakes. The corners should be staked as wind will more likely affect this high profile design. There is a ziplock bag with the orange guylines, but these may only be needed in more windy conditions or to pull out the fly for more air circulation. Please take the time to make sure the tent is dry, cleaned out, and zippers closed before folding. Pack a small whisk broom, if necessary. It will be a challenge to fit everything into the carrying bag (fold the tent into quarters), but please do so. Finally, remember tents are for sleeping and not an all-day playroom — especially on hot days.

Smokies Dayhike: Rich Mountain Loop, March 4, 2006

I know this risks merely being a running Hiking Club joke, the Hike That Never Was, but here goes again. Unless erosion has worn it away since I first scheduled this hike, Rich Mountain is still in the western part of the Smokies, standing on the north side of Cades Cove. This 8.5-mile loop uses the Rich Mountain Loop Trail, Indian Grave Gap Trail, and the Crooked Arm Ridge Trail to make the climb from 1900 ft to 3700 ft and back down again. This hike is somewhat complementary to Garry Luttrell's hike a year ago from Cades Cove to the Wye – where he went east from the Crooked Arm trail, this hike will explore the loop just to the west (see his report and pictures in the January 2005 newsletter). With leaves down, we should enjoy more numerous and more expansive views - and each of the three trails we use have advertised views even when the leaves are in place: views of the main spine of the Smokies to the south, and of Cades Cove lying between. Perhaps there will be snow, underfoot or in the distance. Closer at hand, we will see the several different forest types, Crooked Arm Falls, the John Oliver Cabin (from early 1800's), and a fire tower site. We will meet in Colonial Heights in the parking lot between McDonalds and the bank at 7:00 a.m. - yes, the hour is early but it is a long drive to the entrance of Cades Cove where the trailhead is, and the days will still be short. Please call for more information as the time approaches. Watch the weather; dress appropriately for a late winter hike and do bring lunch and adequate water. Depending on the hour we may eat out on the return trip.


Trip Report: Hot Springs Loop, Saturday, February 18, 2006

Eight intrepid hikers met in Colonial Heights on February 18th for this snowy 12-mile loop hike out of Hot Springs, N.C. The snow was falling thickly but the roads were clear – when we left! It was a bit dicier as we crept out of Greeneville and through Allen Gap on an unplowed slippery highway, and then slid down the mountain into Hot Springs, where it was spitting some snow but mostly rain! But as we climbed up Lovers Leap Ridge on the A.T. from the French Broad River, the rain changed to snow, and we hiked the remainder of the hike in 3 – 4 inches of snow. With the flakes falling fast and furiously at times, the winter views were very limited and the sky looked threatening all day. Some took a shortcut via the Silvermine Trail and found chicken wings at the Paddlers Pub in town.
