The 2011 Biennial Appalachian Trail Conservancy meeting, "Virginia Journeys 2011," will be held from July 1-8 at Emory & Henry College, less than an hour from Kingsport near Abingdon. The hike organizers have planned hikes covering 190 miles of the AT from north of I-77 to Dennis Cove Road and hikes on trails other than the AT. The seven Central/Southwest Virginia clubs which comprise the Virginia Regional Partnership Committee are the host clubs for this event; but we're the closest club to the venue other than the Mt. Rogers Appalachian Trail Club (MRATC). MRATC and other Virginians provided us with a lot of help when we co-hosted the 2005 Biennial meeting at ETSU, and this will be a good time to return the favor especially with the Tennessee hikes. The following Tennessee hikes are planned, 2-4 every day from July 2-8.

Backbone Rock Trail to AT then to Damascus - three hikes
Gentry Creek Falls - two hikes
Rogers Ridge Trail - one hike

During our first two weeks of Konnarock this summer, we completed the final two relocations of our multi-year project between Grassy Ridge and Bradley Gap. We've already received numerous good comments about the project. We can now turn Konnarock loose on one of our two current major A. T. relocation projects, from Hughes Gap to Cloudland on Roan Mountain. In May, we started working between Hughes Gap and Beartown Mountain with Hard Core, and will be working with Konnarock on the next relocation below that one. It is a steep but relatively short walk in from Hughes Gap. The Konnarock projects are good training opportunities for volunteers who have interest but not a lot of experience with Trail construction. Pinnacle Natural Area Preserve, August 14, 2010

Hike Leader: Vic Hasler



Rating: F/B, roughly 5-6 miles round trip, moderate pace with several stops, limited elevation change

Come explore. The Pinnacle Natural Area Preserve has a swinging bridge, a pair of waterfalls, a creek, and a tall rock formation. Check out the DCR website including the link to additional photos.

Meet in Colonial Heights in the parking lot between McDonalds and the bank, to leave at 8:30AM for the 61- mile (80-minute) drive via Abingdon and Lebanon, VA to the preserve. Group choice on the trails to follow, but intention is to check out the swinging bridge, then follow the creek by the falls to see the pinnacle and Clinch River. Bring a lunch to eat half-mile in at the picnic tables (with bathrooms!). Also have plenty of water, camera, water shoes (if wading), and be prepared for weather (will cancel if high chance of heavy rain is forecasted). We should be back in Kingsport by late afternoon. Abram's Falls, August 21, 2010

What I think is the most beautiful falls in East TN is located just a few minutes from Exit 1 in Bristol, VA. If you Google "Abrams Falls" you can see pictures of the falls. The trail to the falls as well as the falls itself is on private property that has been posted for some time, so many have not seen this gem of a falls. There is an opportunity to hike to the falls August 21, with the blessing of the property owner. The deal is to carry a trash bag in and haul out some trash. If you want to participate, email or call Bill Tindall, 357-4850. More information: I own some woodland near the falls and became acquainted with Susan Fiene, estate executor for the property. As a result of efforts by property owners to lessen some of the misuse of the area by 4-wheelers, etc., she wants to be rid of trash that has accumulated at the falls and I suggested she organize an Abrams Falls Clean-Up Day. Susan is a good organizer and she jumped right on the opportunity. The Falls are truly nice. They are tall, and horseshoe shaped, a straight veiled drop, with a series of shallow ledges below. The water is not deep below the falls, so good camera angles can be arranged for photographing it without getting ones knees wet. The "trail" to the falls is primitive, narrow, and traverses occasional ledges with drop-offs. This is not a trail for small children or those with unsure footing. My wife and I have no problem navigating the trail, but I can easily imagine that some might.

For over 50 years, the AT-maintaining clubs south of Shenandoah National Park gathered for a weekend of hiking and fellowship called the Multi-Club Meet. The clubs took turns hosting this event, generally on Labor Day weekend. Although some meetings drew over 100 participants, attendance dwindled in the 1990's and 2000's. Several years ago a decision was made to terminate the event because attendance didn't justify the work being put forth to host it; clubs were having catered dinners, providing entertainment, and offering excursions. Last year, the ATC Deep South Regional Partnership Committee (RPC) decided to try to resuscitate the meeting for the five southern clubs in 2010, in a less involved manner not requiring so much work by the host club (dubbed "Multi-Club Lite"). Purpose: Annual maintenance

Location: Section 12c, Sugar Hollow Creek to Campbell Hollow Road

Summary: We performed annual maintenance, with an emphasis on pruning and blazing. The trail was generally in good shape with no significant blowdowns. It was a beautiful day and we encountered about 15 hikers including a mix of through hikers, some hikers doing shorter backpacking trips, and some day hikers checking out Jones Falls.

Summary: I cut weeds and cleaned out the spring at the north end of my section. There is a significant new blowdown on this section, located about 3/4 mile north of US421. A tree with a trunk of about 36" diameter has fallen over the trail, along with the root ball. The root ball, as well as part of the truck, is lying across the trail. I cut weeds and cleared a path on the high side, but this route involves scrambling up and down some large, potentially slippery rocks. So this needs some attention fairly soon.

Summary: We cut weeds, cleared waterbars, painted blazes, and lopped back annual growth on a very warm day. We also posted a new water sign at the south end of the section. The stinging nettle and jewelweed were prolific throughout the section. The top of a tree has fallen across the trail about one mile south of McQueens Gap, resulting in several blowdowns; I will remove on a future trip.

Summary: We cut weeds, lopped tree growth, removed some minor blowdowns, and cleaned waterbars from Bradley Gap to Stan Murray shelter. Weed growth is the most it has been in several years. Because of some equipment and planning problems, we need to cut weeds a little more just north of Yellow Mt Gap or the rains will have the tall weeds on the trail again. Ted and Ed were able to get off the mountain early enough to purchase some of the supplies for repairing the Overmountain Shelter with money from a North Carolina License Plate grant.

Purpose: Remove blowdown and rehab trail **Location:** Section 3b, Spring to US421

People: Daryel Anderson, Paul Benfield, Richard Carter, Carl Fritz, Ted Mowery, Bob Peoples, Gerald Scott, Tim Stewart **Summary:** We were able to cut a section out of a 30" blowdown after supporting the trunk with rocks. We removed about a half mile of barb wire and woven wire that were just beside the trail and were a nuisance when cutting weeds. We installed about four new waterbars and cleaned about fourteen. About 2 miles north of 421, the trail had sloughed off and created a garland amongst the trees. We dug 375 feet of trail to move it back up about three to six feet higher. At the end of day, we were without water due to the record high temperature.

Summary: Ed helped biologists inspect relocations north of Ash Gap. A couple of very rare spiders were found; therefore he moved the relocation away from the problem rocks. In essence these relocations will be approved as soon as the paperwork is executed.

Summary: Paul, Carl and Gray Buckles, Trails Technician, Nolichuckey/Unaka Ranger District, scouted access to Curley Maple Gap to transport shelter materials. All looks on schedule to rebuild the shelter this fall. Carl and Paul also walked out to Nolichucky Expeditions and cleared some immediate problems with a hand saw. The Trail is in fair shape. Closer to the shelter, rhododendron overhead are sagging into Trail in poor weather. Close to Nolichuckey Expeditions is about an 8" pine blowdown that hikers are getting around. It can be cleared with a good hand saw.

Summary: I replaced the Watauga Lake Shelter register with a new one to check the old one for bear reports. The first bear report was May 1 and remained steady through May, tapering off in June with the most recent on June 28. Of course that corresponds to thru-hiker season. Reports said that bears were persistent and not easily run off, but no reports indicated they were aggressive. Several hikers reported seeing bears while camped along the lake. Some mentioned trash at or near the shelter, including dog food. Shelter and campsites were clean on this trip. I took a small saw, removed one blowdown and whacked a few briars and privet, but Trail is in great shape and relos look very good. The blockage of the gravel road leading from Shook Branch Road to the cemetery has been removed.
