Bill Berry sets a High Standard as a Trail Maintainer

Bill Berry has been an avid outdoorsman for many years. He has developed a passion to maintain hiking trails. For about ten years he maintained a couple of trail sections for the Carolina Mountain Club (CMC) up until 2001. CMC does not have maintenance records from that period, but they believe he probably had close to 1000 hours with their club. He adopted a TEHCC section in 1992. Initially he was maintaining an 11.2-mile section of trail which starts north from Spivey Gap and ends at the Nolichucky River. His section was later shortened to end at Temple Hill Gap and is now only 7.3 miles! Unfortunately, our maintenance records only go back to 1992. But since 1992 he has averaged over 50 hours of maintenance a year and has amassed about 1140 total hours. He is the first TEHCC maintainer who has accumulated 1000 hours solely by working on a trail section. Bill is very self sufficient in handling routine trail repairs, blazing, lopping and blowdown clearing. Sometimes he can convince his grandchildren to help him. If conditions are bad however, he readily requests club support with chainsaws. Bill and his wife frequently camp in the Smoky Mountains and he hikes those trails also. He has taken trail maintenance training there and is planning to adopt a trail section in the Smokies. So even though he has accumulated over 2000 hours of AT maintenance by adopting sections, he is still expanding to other trails. Thanks, Bill!

Roaring Branch Trail up to High Butte, March 19th, 2011

Rating: ~7 miles round trip, moderate pace with several stops, climb and return from 1600 to 3000-ft elevation mostly at start and turnaround point. Begin at a cascading waterfall. Proceed along the creek through old growth forest. Climb the ridge line up to a rocky overlook for the Powell River valley. All within the Stone Mountain section of Jefferson National Forest.

Meet in Colonial Heights to carpool (limited parking at trailhead) and leave by 8:30AM for the hour drive via Big Stone Gap. After admiring the heavy spring flow over the Roaring Branch waterfall, we'll proceed up stone stairs created by youth conservation corps. The pace through the very large trees with little undergrowth will be broken by stops to find geocaches. There are three stream crossings. We will eat lunch up on High Butte, reverse direction back to cars, and arrive in Kingsport by late afternoon. Spring Wildflower Hike - Rock Creek Falls, Saturday, April 16, 2011

Our spring wildflower hikes are generally fairly short and easy, and suitable for all but very young children. That's the case as we resume them this year, to nearby and pretty Rock Creek Falls near Erwin. A trail of 2 miles (each way) with an elevation gain of 1000 feet leads from the swimming pool at the Cherokee National Forest Rock Creek Recreation Area into the Unaka Mountain Wilderness, passing several falls and cascades on the way to a beautiful amphitheater-like setting at the main falls, about 50' high. There are four non-bridged crossings of the creek along the way, so expect to get your feet wet; good to have a dry pair of shoes waiting at the car. The Forest Service limits

group size in the Wilderness to 14 so pre-registration by contacting Joe is essential, and in keeping with the wilderness character this hike will be no dogs, please. We'll depart at 9:00 AM from the parking lot between McDonald's and State of Franklin Bank in Colonial Heights, and stop by Parkway Discount Wine and Liquor on South Roan Street in Johnson City at 9:30 for anyone who prefers to meet there. We plan to lunch at the falls. Bring clothing suitable for the occasionally wet and fickle early spring weather.

The hike of February 18 was on the Little Stony Creek Trail from the entrance gate of Hanging Rock Park near Dungannon, Virginia, up the creek past cascades, waterfalls and natural barricades, and on to a dramatic lookout point for good views and lunch, after which we returned to our cars. The weather was ideal. We went a total distance of around 6.5 miles.

The barricades I referred to are trees that fell across the trail during the record-breaking snowfall and high winds of December 18, 2009. An unofficial report at that time was that possibly a hundred trees blocked the trail as a result of the storm. Since then the Forest Service and volunteer groups have worked to make the trail usable again and we're now able to report that you can indeed get from the lower end of the trail to the gravel road at the upper end. However, there are still a half-dozen or so places where downed trees haven't yet been removed. They make this formerly-easy ramble into an obstacle course, more suitable for Parris Island recruits than for the old folks.

Backpack: Virgin Falls Pocket Wilderness, south of Sparta, TN, February 19-20, 2011

“This place looks familiar...”

This trip started out innocent enough....we all met at the Ingles parking lot in Colonial Heights and departed promptly at 8am on Saturday. The drive to Crossville zipped by as there was plenty of conversation about hiking and paddling with much advice and stories passed around. Once in Crossville, we started following Google Map's direction and also Ian's GPS to get to the trail head. This proved to be a fruitless effort as both sources wanted us to travel through some serious off-road areas. We even crossed a creek at one point! All the while, Ian kept muttering his now famous line, “This place looks familiar.” With much debate, we finally figured out how to get to our destination and started our hike after what amounted to a five hour drive.

This hike starts out on the Cumberland Plateau and descends into a gorge following a stream until we reached our destination on the banks of the Caney River and covers roughly 4 miles. Along the way, we passed four truly incredible waterfalls. The first is reached after about a mile of hiking. Big Branch Falls drops about 15-20' and has a large recessed rock shelter on the other side of the stream that is suitable for camping underneath. In another mile, we reached Big Laurel Falls. This waterfall is amazing to say the least. It drops roughly 40' over a ledge and then spills back under the ledge into a washed out cavity in the rocks. The size of the cavity could best be described as “cavernous”. The water then drains into a 2' to 3' hole toward the side of the cavity and disappears. We reached the third fall at roughly the 3 mile mark. This is Sheep's Cave Falls and the total drop is about 100'. This fall comes out of Sheep's Cave and drops roughly 50', pools, and then drops another 40' or so and disappears into another cave at the bottom of a sinkhole. We continued another ½ mile and reached Virgin Falls. This fall drops a little over 100' and is another one that comes out of a cave and drains into a cave. This last waterfall is really spectacular. The area was full of campers setting up for the evening so we snapped a few pictures and moved on to our final destination on the banks of the Caney River. We found an excellent campsite adjacent to some shoals in the river and set up our hammocks. The full moon rose and cast shadows around the camp and we all got a great nights rest. The next morning hiking out, we by-passed the last two falls and made our way to “The Overlook” side trail. This leads to a really nice campsite atop the plateau with rocky overlooks that give views of the entire gorge. After this, we made our way back to the parking area and loaded up for the drive home. The drive home was uneventful and quiet as we were all tired and ready to get home.

This area is an outstanding display of nature. There were many, many day hikers there making the trek down into the gorge as well as several campers setting up at various points along the way. It is probably too long a drive from our area for a day hike, but if you are looking for a good, short-distance back-packing trip with spectacular scenery, you should definitely add this to your list. Summary: After recent high winds, we decided to check the trail for blowdowns. We removed countless small limbs from the trail, cleared a few small blowdowns, and clipped back some rhodos. There are two blowdowns fairly close together about a mile south of Vandeventer. One is about 18 inches in diameter and the other about 8 inches and hanging in a tree which we could not remove. The 18-inch one can be climbed over without too much difficulty and the 8-inch one can be walked under with a little difficulty. We picked up trash at the shelter but didn't hang around there for long as the weather changed from sunny and warm to foggy, windy, cold and rainy. There is still about 6 inches of snow at higher elevations.
