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Letter from the Chair

Work and life events can easily create stress. A study conducted by Stanford and published in the *Proceedings of the National Academy of Science* scientifically proved that hiking can reduce stress, anxiety, and depression! The study indicated that walking 90 minutes in a natural area setting as opposed to the same time in a high-traffic urban area led to decreased activity in a region of the brain associated with a key factor in depression. Besides the mental health benefits, you also get exercise while you're at it! How's that for a win-win? So I hope that's incentive enough to join us on the trails or on your own in the coming months. We have some great options for club-led hikes in September and October, and I hope you'll join us!

This hike will explore all the Preserve has to offer! There are several smaller waterfalls (Big Falls and Spring Falls), a rock formation, and some decent views! What more could you ask for all within 5 miles of hiking. The park sits in SW VA at the intersection of the Big Cedar Creek and Clinch Rivers, approx. 25 miles from Abingdon. Bring water and snacks!

Directions: From I-81 at Abingdon, take ALT 58 west through town to US Route 19N. Go approx. 20 miles to Business 19 in Lebanon. At second light, turn left onto Route 82 West. Go 1.1 miles to Route 640 (River Mountain Rd) and turn right. Got 4.2 miles and turn left onto Route 721 (gravel road). Go 0.8 miles to parking area on left.

I hope you'll join me on a nice hike south of Greeneville, TN on the Chimney Rocks Trail. We will be rewarded with lovely views of an oxbow of the French Broad River at Weaver's Bend. The hike is mostly uphill on the way there, so be prepared with water and snacks for enjoyment/refueling at the top. Hopefully we will also have views of leaf change as well and hope a few leaves have dropped to give us a more expansive view! Turn left/east on unpaved Weaver's Bend Road, crossing single lane bridge. Travel 1.8 miles on this narrow dirt road to a large parking lot. Do not cross the railroad tracks. Parking lot 0.1 miles before trailhead. I'm open to carpooling. If interested, please reach out.

Appalachian Trail Club Helps Cherokee National Forest with Trail Work From August 10, 2022 news release by Cherokee National Forest

From August 10, 2022 news release by Cherokee National Fore: Summarized by Vic Hasler

CNF/Watauga District and TEHCC installed bog bridges and repaired steps in the Bradley Gap section of the Appalachian Trail. The club reached out to Forest Service officials last summer with a solution to mitigate an area constantly wet, resulting in associated trail issues. TEHCC built bog bridges and installed locust posts in the area to rehab steps. Forest Service officials provided UTV support in transporting all the materials from the bottom to the top of the mountain.

"Working along with the Tennessee Eastman Hiking and Canoeing Club has helped a lot in being able to maintain the Appalachian Trail and ensuring the safety of the public," said Chad Ingle, Natural Resource Specialist for the Cherokee National Forest. Also see Joe
