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Letter from the Chair

Happy Spring Everyone! The weather is warming up, the flowers are sprouting, and the sun is finally coming out. It finally feels like spring in NETN! That means that tick season is also here. Yuck! I figured it would be a good time for a reminder of tick prevention methods when spending time in the outdoors.

- Wear long sleeves and pants when hiking. Tucking in your shirt and tucking pant cuffs into your socks is a good idea as well.
- Wear repellent such as picaridin or DEET, or treat clothes with permethrin. If using permethrin, make sure to follow the safety guidelines on the container!
- Wear bright colored clothes to more easily spot ticks that may have hitched a ride.
- Avoid or take caution in tall brush and overgrown trails.
- Check yourself and pets for ticks after being outdoors. Notable places to check include: Under arms, inside and around ears and belly button, back of knees, on your head/in your hair, and between legs.
- If you do get a tick, use a tick removal tool or tweezers to gently pull the tick out, making sure not to detach the head. Don't squeeze or try to smother the tick. Make note of the type of tick, where it attached, and when you found it. Go to the doctor if you develop a rash or fever within several weeks of removing the tick.

More information about ticks and tick prevention can be found on the EPA and CDC websites.

Lastly, our hiking program will be starting this month! April 13th is the first scheduled hike and will be a joint hike with EPDC. Details are given in this newsletter.

Kayak and canoe trips will be starting soon. TEHCC recently acquired a new sit-on-top kayak; so we have added another vessel to our fleet!

Now get out there and (safely) enjoy the great weather and the great outdoors! Happy spring and happy trails!

TEHCC Spring Dinner in Review, March 15, 2024

About 60 members and guests gathered at the Eastman Lodge for our club's Spring Dinner. After fellowship during "Happy Trails Hour," a meal from Olive Garden was served along with desserts and coffee. Leftover t-shirts from the 2023 AT Vista were "free to good homes" with the remaining small size to be donated to a thrift store. Instead of door prizes, two folks took advantage of a discount offered on the soon-to-be-published third edition of the Cherokee National Forest Hiking Guide, which our speaker, Dean Walker, contributed to the Holston Mountain section.

Several recognitions were shared. The pint-glass incentive from our 75th anniversary (2021) highlighted at least 40 field hours of A.T. maintenance contributed by 14 volunteers. Dr. Craig Haire was presented with ATC's Silver Award for 25 years of service (see article below). Bob Fuller was given the Gold Award for 50 years of ATC membership, including involvement with the NY-NJ Trail Conference, Green Mtn Club, Appalachian Mtn Club, and UVA Outing Club. Terence Rose, the new Watauga District Ranger, attended, and Chad Ingle presented USFS rockers for 50 to 800 volunteer hours in 2023. Tara Wu, Pisgah NF Appalachian Ranger District, arranged for 24 members to receive certificates for 1000+



hours cumulative service (see picture), each signed by USFS Chief Randy Moore. As nominated by TEHCC/CMC, Jen Barnhart is the SORO Agency Partner of the Year, while Vic Hasler was chosen as the SORO Club Volunteer of the Year (see article below). Joe Poehlmann was recognized as TEHCC's Paddler of the Year, Josh Hayes as Hiker of the Year, and Elzear Lemieux as Maintainer of the Year. Dean Walker engaged the audience with a review of the trails on Holston Mountain, including some historical paths such as the pre-1954 A.T. route. He then transitioned into the litany of aircraft crashes along Holston Mountain with the tale of searching for the fate of Southeast Airlines Flight 308. This was a DC-3 aircraft that crashed on January 8, 1959, while trying to land at Tri-Cities airport. Dean, with a crew of friends, pieced together various clues, rejecting some as wrong, to find the front landing gear which remains on the mountain.

Vic Hasler, ATC Southern Region Volunteer of the Year

Vic was selected as the 2023 ATC SORO Volunteer of the Year awardee, which was presented at the Spring Dinner Meeting. Vic has had a long history of volunteer contributions to TEHCC and ATC. Most recently, he has guided the club's engagement in the Visitor Use Management (VUM) project for the Roan Highlands team. As a result of his leadership and commitment to the club and the A.T. partnership, Vic was selected as this year's awardee.

Vic has been an A.T. maintainer since 2002, contributing over 2,400 volunteer hours — a large number considering he also has a full-time day job. Vic has taken on several leadership roles in the club as a trail section maintainer, Past Steering Committee Chair, co-lead of the 2023 AT Vista held in Johnson City, A.T. Trail Guidebook editor for TEHCC, ATC Alternate Regional Partnership Representative, and the TEHCC A.T. Committee Chair.



Vic has done an outstanding job in managing a large number of different roles and activities. As an Engineer, he brings attention to detail as he coordinates and plans tasks. This was especially apparent in his roles as guidebook editor and A.T. Committee Chair. TEHCC engages in several activities with the USFS and ATC. These often require Vic to be the point person to represent the club's leadership as a personal contact and in written communications. Vic brings a great deal of skills and passion to his role in many of the administrative responsibilities he undertakes. The role of A.T. Committee Chair is both demanding and rewarding. TEHCC is fortunate to have someone as committed as Vic as the A.T Committee Chair for over 7 years.

Vic is now providing leadership in collaboration with SAHC, ATC, and the USFS, developing a VUM plan to address visitor-use impacts along the A.T. in the Roan Highlands. While it has taken more than two years to bring this to the attention of ATC and the USFS, Vic's persistence has finally gotten this project underway. Hopefully, VUM will bring new ideas to address the complexities of the balds, while providing sustainable options to mitigate the increasing visitor impacts. While this project is just getting started, Vic has certainly been a driving force to get the process going, and will bring organization and solutions to the partnership to protect and enhance the visitor experience along the A.T. in the Roan Highlands. Craig Haire, 25+ Years as a Trail Maintainer



Since 1995, Dr. Craig Haire has maintained the Appalachian Trail section between the Nolichucky River at Chestoa south to Temple Hill Gap, accumulating more than 1400 volunteer hours. The first reference to Craig in the club newsletter was for earning a t-shirt and a year's free membership to ATC (then the Appalachian Trail Conference) for at least five days working with the 1995 Konnarock Crew, completing a series of relocations on Cliff Ridge near Erwin. Joining Craig in this honor were Frank Williams, LuAnn Mack-Drinkard, Ed Oliver, and Joe DeLoach. Winter '97-'98 must have been hard, because the February newsletter has

multiple reports about removing many blowdowns. A crew working in the Chestoa area met Craig who was steadily clearing up the mountain south of the river. In 2000, while Craig was on a 10-month hike, Bruce Cunningham, Bill Elderbrock, and Ed Oliver performed spring maintenance and declared the section was in excellent shape. As part of the Adopt-A-Trail initiative

for the club, Craig made many (up to 14-16 per year) 1-to-5-hour trips to the field for a cycle of weeding, maintenance, and blowdown removal. Even when the club's system for collection of maintenance records was improved to allow descriptions of the work, Craig's were succinct, rarely over a couple-dozen words. Craig is an early adopter of electric-battery tools, such as the older weed whacker shown in the picture. He shares that his current trimmer is a Kobalt model with an 80V battery. He also has been a hike leader for the Mid-Appalachian Hiking Club that performs maintenance for the Iron Mountain Trail.






Roan Mtn Day Use Area/Rhododendron Gardens to Be Closed

Pisgah National Forest announced that the Great American Outdoors Act is funding major improvements to Roan Mountain Recreation Area, which will be closed during the renovations occurring in 2024. Therefore, the access gate will not be opened at the end of May – and likely not the entire year. Work scope includes drilling a new well and replacing the current water distribution system, road surface improvement, replacing curbs and fences, rehabilitating picnic sites, replacing flooring in the visitor center, new interpretive signs, and repairing damage on the observation decks. The closure notice is for the rhododendron gardens, Cloudland parking area and restrooms, and the Cloudland Trail to the overlook at Roan High Bluff. The limited parking area and bathroom at Carver's Gap will remain open, as well as the Appalachian Trail passing through the area. In a separate project, the Roan High Knob Shelter will be closed (dates have not yet been set) to replace the rotting base logs. The adjacent campsite will be available.

Some alternative hiking experiences to consider during the gate closure:

- Carolina Hemlocks Recreation Area: Scenic picnicking on the South Toe River near Burnsville, NC. Opportunities for fishing, hiking, and tubing/wading in the river. Open April 15 - October 30 and has a daily fee of \$5 per vehicle (\$2.50 seniors).
- Craggy Gardens Picnic Area: Off the Blue Ridge Parkway (Milestone 367.6) with a large parking lot, picnic sites, and chance to hike and view rhododendron, azalea, and mountain laurel blooms.
- Beauty Spot: Scenic overlook in the Cherokee National Forest off TN395/NC197 near Erwin, TN. The site has mountain views and rhododendron easily accessible by vehicle.

Summary: We cut blowdowns, lopped briars, and cleaned water diversions on the trail section starting at McQueens Gap and hiking north for three miles. Fourteen blowdowns were remove with a chainsaw. We plan to come back to remove a 22-inch step-over blowdown that was just past Abingdon Gap Shelter. Its on a side hill and an easy stepover, but will be a challenge to remove due to its size and inclination on the sloping hillside. Summary: I completed general maintenance of my new trail section assignment. I drove in on the FS road from Elk Falls. Along the river, I collected two bags of trash and two old tents. The water at Sugar Creek was flowing strongly. I cleared rhododendrons around the creek for easier access. One blowdown along the river was too big for me to tackle. There were many blowdowns from the river up to Campbell Road. I cleared the small and medium blowdowns. However, five blowdowns were too big for me to tackle. One, in particular, was interesting. Someone cut the tree down with a chainsaw, seemingly on the trail on purpose. I cleared branches from around the blowdowns I could not remove to allow for easier passage. I also removed the little spikes on the trees that could hurt a hiker. I saw four hikers and talked to three of them. One was a NOBO thru-hiker. Purpose: ATC Spring Regional Partnership Meeting **Location:** Hungry Mother State Park, Marion, VA

Summary: The annual Regional Partnership Committee (RPC) Meeting is a collective meeting bringing together USFS, ATC, APPA (Appalachian National Scenic Trail NP) and A.T. Clubs to discuss recent policies, legislation, activities, events, and strategies that the partnership faces in the short and long-term basis. Below is a summary of some of the happenings across the partnership.

ATC is preparing a number of events in 2024 to prepare for the 100-year anniversary of the conservancy, established on March 9, 1925. A number of events will be identified, some at the state level and others more regionally. ATC is refilling a number of staff positions with changes in personnel. A review of the 40-year-old comprehensive plan revealed recommendations that NPS will make to update the plan to better reflect changes in culture and responsibilities that have occurred over 40 years.

ATC has developed a checklist for clubs called a "vitality index." It highlights a number of organizational, administrative, and functional characteristics to help clubs be more effective and to develop a leader legacy circle. The list will be available on the website as a resource to ID gaps where ATC can help.

Training was discussed during the breakout session for the southern region. Sawyers are expected to complete 4 steps before they operate in the field: First Aid and CPR training, Sawyer safety training, evaluation by a qualified trainer, and a Sawyer certification step. First Aid must be completed before Sawyer certification. After certification, the final authorization step is required by a land manager before a Sawyer can operate a saw on public land. ATC offers up to \$65 reimbursement for First Aid. Clubs are using local universities, American Red Cross, retired physicians in their clubs, and local health care systems for training. The ATC website is a resource for replacement equipment. The USFS now has resources available for Sawyer training, and clubs are encouraged to use these as a first choice vs a contractor. ATC is also launching a new capital project and Konnarock form. It replaces the earlier complex form and is expected to allow more electronic routing and improved tracking. Clubs are encouraged to use the new forms to submit capital projects. The new forms which will be posted on the ATC website. Konnarock notifications are expected to go out April 15-30th.

TEHCC is one of the few clubs up-to-date on ATC MOU and volunteer service agreements with the USFS partners. The club has been able to benefit from the TN and NC license plate program. In TN, only \$16,000 was requested and so there is another \$10,000 available for further needs. NC requests came in close to the \$34,000 that is available this year.

ATC is developing plans for high-use impact areas, including heavily visited trail sections, overnight sites, and parking. An assessment identified 387 heavy-use overnight sites and more than 5,500 sites total for the whole trail. ATC is using the Visitor Use Management (VUM) Process to develop long term plans to help mitigate expanding impacts. Currently there are 15 areas using the 14-step VUM process. The Roan Highlands section from Hughes Gap to 19E is the area where we started a VUM process in 2022. Currently, we are on step 7 of the 14-step process. ATC is launching the use of a GIS system called RIMS to capture visitor-use field data. ATC is seeking feedback by April 5 on policies being developed for energy structures, such as structures for wind energy, pipelines, and solar arrays.

APPA is helping to fund sanitation facilities on USFS lands in VA. A universal design based on a 2-bin moldering privy will be available, along with funds to add more of these to A.T. sections in Region 8. Funds of \$3.1M from NPS and ATC are for the Triple Crown VUM process. Funds for large projects can be made available as VUMs identify needs.

USFS was well-represented at the meeting. At the regional level, the Great American Outdoor Act (GAOA) is being used to help fund maintenance for 5 years. Upgrading the Konnarock facility in VA is at risk of missing funding in this round, but hopefully will be funded in the next round. USFS will launch a new program called Reimagining Recreation on May 6. The program is linked to the 100-year ATC anniversary.

TEHCC's Vic Hasler was selected as the SORO Volunteer of the Year! A framed plaque was presented to the club to present to Vic. Congratulations Vic!
