Letter from the Chair

Happy August, everyone! July was a doozy with the heat and drought; but now it seems that rain showers and thunderstorms have returned to East Tennessee. While bringing much relief, they also arrive with danger once again! Both in the form of floods and lightning, of which I'll discuss the latter.

Lightning is a very dangerous thing to encounter, both on the trail and in daily life. While the promise of tree cover may provide some sense of security during a storm, that may not necessarily work for lightning. Growing up in Colorado (one of the leading states for lightning deaths), lightning safety is hammered into you from a young age, and sometimes feels taken for granted. So, I will relay a few lightning safety tips below for everyone to brush up on.

• Preparations and Avoidance

- The safest way to deal with lightning is to avoid it in the first place. If the forecast calls for thunderstorms, it's best to postpone the hike or go to somewhere else not under threat.
- $\,\circ\,$ If you are out and a storm is approaching, get off of mountain tops, ridgelines, and exposed areas.
- Thunderstorms usually appear in the afternoon, so be prepared to finish your hike or bail early to beat any incoming storms.
- Protection
 - If you do get caught in a storm, seek shelter if possible. A fully enclosed building is best, but hard-top vehicles are also safe.
 Open shelters such as many on the A.T. and picnic patios aren't necessarily safe but may be better than an open field.
 - $\,\circ\,$ If shelter isn't nearby, look for low spots in the terrain (depressions, valleys, gulches, etc.).
 - If you have any metal on you (pack frames, poles), put them at least 100 ft from you. Groups of people should also disperse ~100 ft from each other.

• Safety Position

- If lightning is striking close by, and you can't get to a fully enclosed shelter, the safety position should be done.
 - Crouch on the ground on the balls of your feet with your feet together. Lower your head and cover your ears.
 - NEVER lie flat on the ground!

Hopefully this column has been a useful refresher for you all! Remember, if it thunders, it's best to start packing up and heading back to the car! I hope everyone stays cool, dry, and safe for the remainder of this wild summer! Have fun out there!

Appalachian Trail Centennial Act (ATCA)

Compiled from information provided by ATC (Appalachian Trail Conservancy)

This proposed legislation, timed for ATC's upcoming 100th anniversary in 2025, aims to secure the cooperative nature of the Appalachian Trail plus all National Scenic and Historic Trails, as well as strengthen the management roles of trail-maintaining clubs and volunteers alongside their federal partners. No organization can oversee a national trail on its own; thus, the ATCA would bolster the Cooperative Management System and strengthen public-private partnerships needed to protect National Trails. For the A.T., there are 4,700 volunteers spread across 30 trail-maintaining clubs giving roughly 170,000 hours per year.

The Appalachian Trail Centennial Act would:

- Establish Designated Operational Partners (DOP) for National Scenic and Historic Trails. The legislation will clarify the role and responsibilities of non-governmental organizations like the ATC, which must have demonstrated experience in trail management, maintenance, and preservation. Agreements of up to 20 years would be with the National Park Service (NPS), U.S. Forest Service (USFS), or another federal agency. It officially recognizes the critical and essential role of A.T. clubs in the Cooperative Management System.
- Bolster Land Protection. National Scenic and Historic Trails would coordinate efforts related to land and resource conservation with federal, state, and local entities within their corridors.
- Study and Monitor Visitation and Economic Impact. Processes would be created to track visitor levels and usage patterns as well as measure the local economic benefits of trail visitation. Although this data collection and study is common in the National Park and Forest Systems, the National Trails are not consistently considered. Thus, these insights will be useful for planning and managing the visitor experience by the trail communities.
- Better Coordinate Partners. It will also streamline funding/donation processes (such as surplus tools and equipment for trail maintenance) and encourage consultation among government entities, trail administrators, and designated partners to ensure greater stability.

Feedback about this legislative initiative can be shared directly with the Appalachian Trail Conservancy or through our A.T. Committee. It would benefit designated national trails across the country.

A.T. Maintenance Reports

Reporting: Vic Hasler Date: 6/17/2024 Purpose: TEHCC A.T. Committee Location: Eastman Recreation Center People: Steve Falling, Carl Fritz, Vic Hasler, Joe Morris, Renee and Tony Messina, Andy Steffan, Steve Wilson Summary: The Committee continued on the 2024 work plan, including work north of Curley Maple Gap shelter, weed trimming, Roan High Knob shelter repair (delayed to 2025), and Konnarock Crew. Consensus was not favorable on installing bear boxes; but if placed, first ones would be placed at the shelters at Abingdon Gap, Iron Mountain, and No Business Knob, due to reported bear encounters.

We returned home to get a string trimmer; then cut back encroaching vegetation at the two trailheads at Carvers Gap (south & north). We also painted blazes to the water source and on the A.T. at the beginning of the trail headed south.

Summary: The remaining logs for the Roan High Knob Shelter rehabilitation were cut to length and transported by the USFS to Toll House Gap. They included: 2 pcs 9-10 inch x 9 ft, 2 pcs 9-10 inch x 15 ft, 1 pc 10-11 inch x 17 ft, additional front wall replacement locust, and two corner posts. The crew also dug 300 feet of new bench halfway between Double Springs and TN 91.

I moved on to Weedy Gap where I turned around since it was getting too dark to see. I pruned low hanging limbs on the way back to the trailhead. The spring was flowing well.

Summary: I weed whacked from the parking area to 1/2 mile southwest, finishing just beyond the peak of McQueen Knob. I cleared a swath approximately 4 ft wide; edged the downhill side of the worn trail and cut back weeds 3 ft on the uphill side. Tall weeds on the downhill side were topped off so not to obstruct hikers using the worn path. Of note, there were two blowdowns in this section: one in sight of the parking area, the other 1/2 mile SW.

Summary: We had three extra Forest Service workers that made a huge difference and allowed us to finish the section in one full day. Forest Service trucks took us up to Beauty Spot and delivered groups from there, up and down the section. Our main work was cutting weeds along the very overgrown trail. Vegetation was cut back as needed, but will need it again on the ridgeline where it is very thick. We might need help with bigger equipment to cut back a couple feet in a half-mile section. We also cleaned water diversions, removed blowdowns, picked up trash, and checked the water source.

Summary: I decided to weed whack the Canute Place. It was a long, tiresome day. I drove in as far as I could on FS293 and parked before the trench. That left about 1½ miles of hiking on the road to the Moreland Gap Shelter access. I bushwhacked up to the spring which was flowing nicely. Before setting off to Canute Place, I repainted the graffiti board at the shelter. Of course there were rhodos to lop into submission. At Canute Place, it took about an hour to beat the tall grass down, including the blue-blazer to the spring. The spring was flowing nicely. The heat and humidity wore me down. I was happy to make it back to the car. The Forest Service needs to regrade the road soon. That would save at least 3-4 miles of hiking.


